## **NOVEMBER TASKS TO PUT THE GARDEN TO BED- Sandy Orr**

- 1) Chop leaves with which to mulch beds. If you can't run a lawnmower over the leaves, mulch thinly with them so that water can penetrate to the ground. John Wham used an old plastic trash can to collect leaves, and then chopped them with a weed eater inserted into the can.
- 2) Plant bulbs- Take advantage of local bulb sales for which you will receive email blasts from now until February. Daffodil bulbs flower just fine even if planted in late December.
- 3) Divide your perennials. Even as late as early December, you can split your perennials' root balls to gain more plants. Don't divide ornamental grasses until spring. They don't establish

well over winter.

- 4) Prune wisteria. Cut back long leggy shoots to two buds off the more mature stems for more flowers next year.
- 5) Wait until trees are fully dormant to prune later in the winter.
- 6) Transplant trees and shrubs. This is an even better time than spring to plant these.
- 7) Feed the soil in your beds and around the root balls of your plants. Put a ring of compost in the root zone away from the main crown area.
- 8) Leave grass flowers and seed heads of perennials for birds to eat. Chop and drop these for compost in February.
- 9) Give evergreens such as yew and boxwoods a cleanup trim to shape.
- 10) Remove dead annuals, or chop stems for mulch and leave roots in ground to aerate.
